# **ANDREA MILNE**

PhD Candidate, Department of History, UC Irvine 2016-2017 AAUW American Dissertation Fellow Senior Pedagogical Fellow, UC Irvine Center for Engaged Instruction



Andrea Milne is a twentieth century U.S. historian whose work sits at the intersection of gender, sexuality, and medicine. Her primary focus is the history of HIV/AIDS; Milne's dissertation looks at the nurses who formed the first AIDS ward in the United States. She's also written on activism performed by women interned at the Carville National Leprosarium in the 1940s 50s, and 60s. A Senior Pedagogical Fellow at UC Irvine's Center for Engaged Instruction, Milne is passionate about teaching, and mentors aspiring academics and instructors at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. When she is not doing academic work, Milne works as the Research Assistant for Nate DiMeo's Peabody Award-nominated history podcast, *The Memory Palace*. # **Public Policy**

Last month, I urged you to write to our representatives in Washington and Sacramento and to express your opinion in our local press. I thought we might have a contest to see who among us can find the most grammatical, spelling, and/or English usage mistakes in the Desert Sun during a specific month. Let's hope none of those mistakes are in our correspondence.

I'm sure our newest senator, Kamala Harris, would love to hear from you about repeal of the ACA, commonly referred to as Obamacare, but technically known as the Affordable Care Act. Address mail to Ms. Harris at 408 Dirksen Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C. 20510 or telephone her office at (202) 224-3553. This could be the answer to stop the money draining out of the Social Security Trust Fund. Repeal the ACA, drop all those (us) old freeloaders from the exchanges where they (we) get free or subsidized health insurance benefits to supplement our Medicare and they (we) will die and stop getting social security benefits. Resolution of the problem of diminution of the Social Security Trust Fund may be an incidental benefit of repeal of the Affordable Care Act.

Let's remember that Merrick Garland is still waiting for the Senate to hold confirmation hearings on his nomination (since March 16, 2016) to the Supreme Court. He now holds the record for time spent waiting for hearings to confirm or reject. Justice Thomas waited 99 days for confirmation. Justice Louis Brandeis, nominated by President Wilson on Jan. 28, 1916 and seated only 100 days later on June 5, 1916, held the record for the longest time to wait for confirmation until Judge Garland (Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia) came along. With the help of the Senate, he has set a new record. His nomination is still pending at 300 days and counting.

# **Campus Teams Use AAUW Funds to Shatter Glass Ceiling**

In 2017, more than 5% of Fortune 500 CEOs will be women, a record high number. Despite this progress, only 27 women CEOs in the entire country indicate how much more work needs to be done. To combat this gender leadership gap, we've awarded 11 campus teams Campus Action Project (CAP) grants to put AAUW's research into action.

Inspired by AAUW's research report, <u>Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership</u>, students, faculty, and staff will confront stereotypes and bias in their communities this spring. From building mentorship programs to creating large-scale networking events for women, these teams show us what #leadHERship is all about.

The 2017 CAP teams represent the spectrum of higher education institutions — the Ivy League, public universities, community colleges, historically black and tribal universities, and our first international school.



# What is Tech Trek STEM Camp & Why do we Support it?

Tech Trek is a STEM camp designed to develop interest, excitement and confidence for Science, Technology, Engineering, Math in young women who will enter eighth grade in the fall. Activities are held on the UC Irvine campus where campers have the chance to live the life of a college student. They will experience community living - eating in the dining commons, sharing a dorm room with a roommate - all under careful staff supervision. Since 2000, Palm Springs branch has sent 117 Valley girls to AAUW Tech Trek Camp.

### How Tech Trekkers are chosen

Every girl attending Tech Trek STEM Camp is on a full sponsorship and is first recommended for the program by her middle school science or math teacher. The Palm Springs TT Committee gives schools and teachers guidelines for nominating campers. Recommended girls and their parents are contacted and girls are asked to write a short essay.

The TT committee interviews prospective campers and from there will select nine campers based on the amount of sponsorship money the branch raised - \$950 per girl. Parents are asked to contribute \$50.

# Faculty and staff

Camp Directors identify excellent, experienced teachers with superior knowledge of their subjects and a high degree of interest in working with middle school girls. AAUW member-volunteers serve as dorm moms, camp nurses and classroom aides. High school and college girls (former campers) provide assistance to teachers and other staff.

# Workshops and field trip

At each camp, girls receive an in-depth, week-long course focused on STEM core classes that they attend daily. Rotating labs are designed to explore individual specialties more deeply. Girls also take shorter math and science-related and off-campus field trips that encourage maximum learning.
