PUBLIC POLICY - TIPPING

DID YOU READ THE ARTICLE?

I am talking about the article in the last edition of the AAUW Outlook concerning wages and tipping. If you did you will probably never look at tipping in quite the same way again. I know that I never shall. The federal laws governing tipping and the accompanying wages go back to the first federal minimum wage law in 1938 when the minimum wage was .25 per hour. In 1966 the federal minimum wage had risen to \$2.13. That is when people working in service jobs that usually receive tips were separated from other workers and their federal minimum wage has stayed at \$2.13. The expectation is that their tips will bring them up to the minimum wage. Some states require the full federal minimum wage of \$7.25 or more to be paid but about half still allow \$2.13 an hour as base pay. The national median for tipped workers comes out to less than \$9.00 an hour. If you earn as little as \$30.00 a month in tips you fall under the law that allows that minimum wage of \$2.13. We have to do better than this for our many service workers. Think about all of this when you calculate your next tips and be as generous as you can be. Better yet and at the same time support those forward thinking people who are working for decent wages that make tipping unnecessary.

Attending camp on a university campus helps girls, especially those whose parents may not have gone to college, to see themselves seeking higher education. The university campus experience gives girls a chance to think about the opportunities a college education can afford them. Camp field trips encourage maximum interaction and instruction in environments where STEM professionals work. Girls are immersed in a world in which they are empowered by their capabilities and encouraged to think about themselves not just as young women but also as future doctors, scientists, engineers, mathematicians, and computer scientists.
