AAUW Funds: Selected Professions Fellowships

Selected Professions Fellowships are awarded to women who intend to pursue a full-time course of study at accredited U.S. institutions during the fellowship year in one of the designated degree programs where women's participation traditionally has been low (see list below). Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents.

Selected Professions Fellowships are awarded for the following master's programs:

- Architecture
- Computer/information sciences
- Engineering
- Mathematics/statistics

Fellowships in the following degree programs are restricted to women of color, who have been underrepresented in these fields:

- Master's in business administration second year of study only
- Law third year of study only
- Doctorate in medicine third or fourth year of study only

Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing

When it comes to the engineering and computing workforce, which accounts for more than 80% of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) jobs, women remain dramatically underrepresented. Women make up just 26% of the computing workforce and 12% of the engineering workforce, and African American, Hispanic, and Native American women are especially underrepresented.

AAUW's upcoming research report, *Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing*, will feature the latest data on girls' achievement in subjects related to engineering and computing, how few women are working in these fields, and what can be done.

Getting more women into STEM fields isn't only the right thing to do; it's the smart thing to do. The solutions to problems of this century - from providing universal access to health care to eradicating poverty to curing cancer - will require the skills of engineers and computer scientists and the perspectives and approaches that come from diverse minds.

Solving the Equation will describe the current factors behind the persistent underrepresentation of women in the computing and engineering workforce and make evidence-based recommendations for change so that girls who want to invent the next Facebook or build the next Mars rover will feel empowered to do what inspires them.

EQUAL PAY DAY

It is time once again to remind ourselves that our battle for economic equality has not been won. We have made some progress but there is more still to be done. April 14, 2015, marks the symbolic day when women's earnings catch up to men's earnings from the previous year. According to census statistics released in 2013, women working full time the year round make on average 78 cents for every dollar a male earns doing the same work. The pay gap is even worse for women of color. For African American women the gap is 64 cents and for Hispanic women only 54 cents.

This year's date has an interesting twist as it also happens to be the birthday of fair pay advocate Lilly Ledbetter. Her legal challenge helped us make some gains but there is still much to be done. How about a few letters to the editor of *The Desert Sun*? I am going to write one. If you do, mention AAUW as this is one of our Public Policy issues.
