# She will be my heroine for all time. Her name

## **My Heroine** by Peggy Shippen

This month we'll be transitioning from the History of our Suffragettes to a column for members to engage titled **My Heroine**. Who is your heroine? Is she from your past or someone in the present? Is she real or a fantasy – a woman you admired from a movie or someone you admired in a novel? Take a moment to reflect then write your most precious thoughts and memories about why this woman is your heroine. This first piece is one I wrote for a recent Suffragette Zoom Party I attended where all of us wrote then shared heartwarming words about our suffragette heroines.

This year, American women are celebrating the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of American Women Winning the Right to Vote that began around 1850, began as a movement by Lucy Stone, Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. All were raised as peaceloving Quakers who actively opposed slavery and believed women held the same spiritual power as men. Growing up as Quaker girls, they were allowed to speak and have influence, developing self-confidence and self-worth. All began as activists in the abolitionist movement but as women they were limited. This led them to advocating that women be treated more as equals among men. They decided this would best be accomplished by women simply being given the right to vote. While these women were heroines in their accomplishments of increased awareness and that by 1897 four states gave women the right to vote, my heroine is Alice Paul.

Alice Paul, younger than the other women, was a descendent of William Penn, raised in a Quaker family and attended suffragist meetings with her mother. Educated at Swarthmore College with a degree in biology, Paul earned a Masters degree in economics and political science and a PhD in sociology from the University of Pennsylvania. In her dissertation "The Legal Position of Women in Pennsylvania", Paul about women's suffrage as the key issue of the day.

The suffrage movement was stalled when Paul graduated college. She realized that the work of the women before her needed to be re-energized and tactics needed to be changed. With single-minded focus, tenacity and with physical and mental resilience, Paul "would not merely lead the movement in a few years time; she would live and breathe it, working harder than anyone else and sacrificing every other part of her life for it's goals."\* For 13 years, Paul led women suffragettes from all over the country and personally endured arrest, humiliation and rebuff from President Wilson and being force-fed and jailed in horrific conditions (once for 70 days) to gain Presidential and Congressional support for women's right to vote. Paul was in Tennessee lobbying when House Rep Harry Burn of Mouse Creek, TN (kindly but firmly encouraged by his mother Febb Ensminger Burn to do so!) cast the vote allowing the Nineteenth Amendment – Women's Right to Vote – to become law on August 26, 1920.

Alice Paul unfurled a suffrage flag she had been sewing with a star on it for each state that voted for women's right to vote. Three months later she and millions of other

American women voted for the first time in a presidential election. What did Alice Paul do for another 57 years until she died in 1977 at age of 92? After sacrificing physically and mentally beyond what any of us would be willing to do for the right of all of us to vote, Paul proposed and advocated for the passage of the "Lucretia Mott Amendment" to the Constitution - now known as the Equal Rights Amendment. My heroine!

## Title IX Is Being Decimated: Will You Help?

It would also authorize competitive grants to K-12 schools, colleges, local educational agencies, or states to support their gender equity work.

AAUW advocates were key to the passage of Title IX, and we continue to fight today to realize the full promise of the law, despite the recent announcement of this harmful rule.
