

President's Message Sharrell Blakeley

I have been a bit low lately, mostly due to these scary times and potential erasure of women's rights. I am uplifted by involvement in our Branch, the opportunity to maintain friendships, learn new things through chats with members, take a break from isolation and focus on how important it is





















to support AAUW's ballot propositions. Columnist Mary McNamara wrote an article in the *LA Times* on Saturday, September 19th. Because it so powerfully impacted me, I have captured some of it below:

The world changed, politics roared, America's mood shifted this way and that, and Ginsburg worked, steadily as she had always done, dismantling injustice wherever she could. Year after year, she painstakingly unraveled tangled patterns of the law to find where the truth was hidden, then stitched it up again so everyone could see what she saw.

RBG, with her love of opera and her lace collars, falling like a cavalie's over her black robes. What's wrong with a little style? Nothing, shouted fans half a century younger than her, drawn by her straight-talking defense of gay marriage, abortion rights, women's rights and civil rights; they called her Notorious RBG and tattooed her face on their bodies.

A role model at 60, a rock star at 80, she never seemed to change. Five-foot-nothing and 100 pounds dripping wet, she beat colon cancer, early-stage pancreatic cancer, lung cancer. In 2014, she received a coronary stent. She did not think well of President Trump, who has already appointed two conservative Supreme Court Justices, one amid scandal and controversy. RBG made it clear she would do her level best to outlive his presidency, and many people, including me, prayed she would; without her presence on the court, the fate of so many of the civil rights she defended for so long seemed even more at risk. We held our breath with every hospital visit, waiting anxiously for her to send a message of reassurance. And then we would sigh in relief. RBG. She seemed unbreakable, unflappable, possibly immortal. But she wasn't.

And more important, she didn't have to be. When she knew that even she could not beat the metastatic pancreatic cancer that would kill her, she dictated a statement to her granddaughter: "My most fervent wish is that I not be replaced until the new president is installed." And indeed, as reports of her death broke, newscasters almost immediately turned to the question of what would happen next, while others wondered how much worse this terrible year could get.

I don't blame those television anchors. When you work for a news organization, you learn to put shock and grief on hold, especially if you're on television. Something terrible happens, someone important dies, and it's news, which is your job. You don't cry; you report. You go to work: Who's doing what, where is it going, how much time do we have.

I have written often about the dead; I had to give myself several minutes to sob only three times: for Robin Williams, for Kobe and Gianna Bryant and now, for Ruth Bader Ginsburg.

This time I wept not just because of the loss but because I couldn't bear the thought of this woman, this brilliant, formidable and kindhearted, once-in-a-century woman summoning what strength she had to make one more demand for justice. As if she hadn't done enough. As if even she thought what mattered most about her death was what happens next.

Maybe in the long run. But not right now. Not in this moment. This country has lost a lot during 2020 — lives, jobs, confidence — but the loss of Ruth Bader Ginsburg transcends this year, and the years that follow. Her death will leave behind the tiniest robes in Supreme Court history, and one of the largest holes ever torn in that history's fabric.

Few members of the United States government have ever been loved, admired and, yes, memed more than Ruth Bader Ginsburg. She was astonishing. So astonishing that her death, even at 87 and after multiple health issues, was honestly and universally shocking. As if a face had fallen off Mount Rushmore.

What happens next is not her responsibility, because, by God, if anyone could die content with what she had given the world — hope, change, insight, clarity, joy,

















A TV interviewer, who was also one of her former law clerks, asked Justice Ruth Bader Ginsgerg "how many women would be necessary to balance the court." And in her feisty and impish yet absolutely brilliant way she grinned and said "nine (9)." With the tragic passing last week of this "larger than life' champion, advocate and "scrapper" for the rights of all Americans and so importantly, for equal rights and a voice for women in the workplace, health and home, and especially now, the "voting booth, the importance and responsibility we all have of voting in the election on November 3 has never had greater meaning or potential consequences.

Get Out the Vote (GOTV)

Last month's first Zoom AAUW meeting was a great success, congratulations Laura for setting the program and Shelley for hosting the meeting... well done! Joan Donahue, from the Riverside League of Women Voters, presentation celebrating 100 years of the "Women's Rights to Vote" was excellent, It was informative, entertaining and timely. I especially enjoyed the power-point presentation filled with unknow facts and anecdotes and enjoyed learning those fun tidbits that school history books just don't cover. So, as the election looms just 34 days in the future, it's relevant to take a few minutes to remember the importance of AAUW's "Get Out the Vote" (GOTV) fight against voter discrimination through on-line resources, action items and policy positions.

Through Represent.Us, a coalition of non-partisan organizations, joined together to mount a multi-million dollar campaign to support vote-by-mail, fair elections and anti-corruption laws nationwide, AAUW links available resources through their national and state websites to help members navigate public policy and voting pitfalls. Check out in the few days, we have left, both AAUW websites if you want clear, up to the minute ways to get the most out of your voting experience.

Here are some important Voting reminders: Ballots will be mailed to all California voters on October 6th. Complete ASAP and return by mail allowing at least 14 days for mail delays. Ballots postmarked by November 3rd will be counted, up to 10 days after the election (Caution; the current mail delays could jeopardize your vote counting!!!) Another option is to complete your ballot and return to one of the available drop-boxes, serviced by the League of Voters, located around the Valley. The locations of drop-boxes are on the back of the Ballot. Be sure to remember to sign and date the ballot envelope.


























Member Spotlight: Vicki Gallay










Tech Trek Update

The 2020 Election: Responsibilities and Opportunities

Responsibility: Vote and help others vote. First you have to register. You can check your registration status online at the CA Secretary of State's website.

Then you have to vote. All registered voters in California will receive a Vote-by-Mail (VBM) ballot in early October. You have choices for using that ballot:

- 1) Complete it and mail it in if you do this, mail early. Ballots must be postmarked by Nov 3. They have 17 days after that date to reach the Registrar's office, but the postmark must be by Nov 3. If you put it in a mailbox on Nov 3 it will not be postmarked in time. Be early!
- 2) Complete the ballot and drop it in an official drop box. Your Registrar of Voters will post locations of drop boxes. The Registrar regularly collects the ballots from the boxes.
- 3) Take your completed ballot to a Vote Center and hand it in. You don't have to use the VBM ballot. You can vote in person and just hand in your unused ballot at a Vote Center.

Opportunity: Candidates - Black women and other women of color This election gives all of us an opportunity to expand our thinking and vision by making a conscious commitment to AAUW's work for racial justice and societal change.

The coronavirus pandemic has disproportionately impacted Black Americans. We are seeing a call to address police brutality. In the face of these historic challenges, a record number of Black women are running for Congress, determined to work for change.

The Center of Women and Politics (CAWP) reports that black women are nearly 8% of the U.S. population, but 4.3% of Congress – only 22 out of 435 Representatives and 1 out of 100 Senators. They are underrepresented in statewide executive's jobs and















among mayors and city councils.

This November, in addition to federal, state and county elections, local elections are on the ballot — cities, school districts, and water districts. There may be black women or women of other ethnicities on the ballot in your area. You can support women of color who are running for office in your community, state and nation. Be aware. Create an environment of inclusion. Make an effort to meet and talk with these candidates. Commend them for stepping up. Listen to their stories and their goals. Ensure they are included in election discussions and activities.

AAUW has a long tradition of advocating for positive societal change and political activism Change is underway, and AAUW can be a part of that.

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
