TECH TREK GIRLS MEET HEATHER NARDONE-STEM POSTER CHILD AT OUR NOVEMBER MEETING



We had a STEM-themed meeting this November with Heather Nardone, STEM poster child and Ariana Hill, Tech Trek girl as our speakers. We were joined by several Tech Trek girls who were selected for Tech Trek Camp, but were unable to attend due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Several Tech Trek Alumni students attended also.

Heather Nardone, the granddaughter of our Tech Trek Coordinator Sharon

Hubbard Salvatora and a college graduate in the STEM field spoke to us about her path from being good in science in 7th grade, to her current occupation as a COVID-19 screener at a Mass General Affiliate Hospital.

Heather's path led her to spending nine months as a Peace Corps volunteer in Rwanda. It was not an easy life. Heather lived off the grid, far from civilization in a house that had no water or electricity. There was literally no road home. The only way to reach her house was two hours off- road by motorcycle taxi. Basic communication was also a challenge. The native language of Rwanda is wildly different than English. Even after three-months of language training, Heather joked about how she could not converse with the people in her host family when she first arrived. Although Heather encountered hardships as a volunteer, she had an upbeat attitude about life in Rwanda and found her Peace Corps experience to be rewarding.


Heather's Peace Corps service was cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic. She now works on Nantucket island as a COVID-19 screener. She is involved with determining where individuals infected with COVID-19 end up in the system and how they get there. Difficult patient prioritization decisions must sometimes be made. Heather's experience as a COVID-19 screener has led her to appreciate the importance of Bioethics in medicine. Heather plans on applying for her Master's in this field in the near future.

Heather's presentation was a huge success! She is intelligent, genuine and delightful. She spoke about her experiences with humor and wisdom. The Tech Trek girls, who are on their own STEM path, were especially engaged by all she had to say. There were so many questions for Heather by members and Tech Trek girls alike that the meeting ran overtime but we were all having such a good time, no one noticed.



Ariana Hill, the Tech Trek girl the Palm Springs Branch sponsored for the Virtual Tech Trek Robotics Camp last summer spoke to our members about her experience at this summer's camp. She worked with the equipment supplied by the AAUW Laguna Beach Branch (circuit boards, LED's, servo motors, Arduino software etc.) to build her own robot. Ariana said

she had fun building her robot hat and highly recommended Virtual Tech Trek Camp to future Tech Trek girls. It was good to hear that Virtual Tech Trek Camp was a success from Ariana because AAUW California is developing a virtual camping approach for the 2021 season.

Update from AAUW

At its October 16, 2020, meeting, the AAUW Board of Directors voted to increase Individual Member dues for the next three years. The dues will rise by \$3 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022, \$5 for



FY 2023 and \$5 for FY 2024, making the total dues amount for those years \$62, \$67 and \$72, respectively. All but \$3 of your annual dues remains tax deductible.

This decision wasn't made lightly. The board members couldn't be more grateful for our members — or prouder of the work you've done this year. We also recognize that all of us are navigating numerous challenges in these uncertain times. However, in order to preserve the viability of this organization we all love, the board needed to take action. Simply put, this measure is essential for AAUW to continue our mission to achieve gender equity.



Most nonprofits adjust their dues annually or every other year to keep pace with inflation and rising expenses. However, due to prudent budgetary management, AAUW has been able to keep its dues flat since July 2018. That means that, by the time the first scheduled increase takes effect, we will have maintained three years of dues stability.

Moreover, in recognition of the difficult economy we're in, the board planned for the initial adjustment to be the most modest. Over the course of the year, it works out to be only an additional 25 cents per month — what we hope is a small price to pay for maintaining our important work and community.

Current life members will not be affected by this change. New life memberships acquired after July 1, 2021, will reflect the higher dues' amounts. College and university membership fees will remain unchanged.

A BIRTHDAY SUPRISE COACHELLA CITY HONORS FRIDA ARRIAGA 2019 Tech Trek Camper and Alumni

Frida Arriaga, now a math student at Shadow Hills High School and 2018 AAUW Tech Trek Camper Alum, was honored by the City of Coachella in a surprise celebration of her civic and school involvement. The surprise event - the unveiling and naming of a new "Frida Way" street in the City of Coachella took place on her 14thbirthday.

I was honored to be invited to the event by Frida's family and sad, being in Oregon, I wasn't able to don my mask and attend in person. I spoke to Frieda's father, Manual Arriaga, before the event. Here – somewhat edited but mostly in his words – is his history of how events leading to "Frida Way" unfolded.

It all began in September 2016, when Frida, a 5^{th} grader, began attending Coral Mountain Academy. It was obvious a traffic signal at the main entrance of the school was needed but the need became more urgent when Frida's friend almost got hit. Frida decided to run for Vice President. She made a campaign speech promising to advocate for a traffic signal and won.

Frida began petitioning by collecting signatures from parents. She submitted close to 800 signatures to Coachella City Mayor, Steven Hernandez, on November 2016. Jonathan Hoy, Coachella City Engineer, requested an analysis by a California Licensed Traffic Engineer who subsequently determined that the signal was needed. Frida invited Jonathan Hoy to come to her school. He told the school board, administrators, teachers and parents they needed to go to a City Council Meeting and request \$200,00 to fund the signal.

Frida and her mother made posters and flyers inviting parents to attend the City



Council Meeting. On March 8th 2017, Frida, accompanied by over 50 parents gave a presentation to the City Council, city staff and the general public (City Council Meetings are live streamed on the internet).

The presentation (above) resulted in the City Council approving \$100,000 - 50% of the cost to design and construct a new traffic signal at the school entrance. City officials also recommended going to the CVUSD Board Meeting to request the other 50% of the cost.

Posters and flyers were made again and on March 16th, 2017 Frida presented the petition at the board meeting mentioning that the city of Coachella had already contributed \$100,000. The board determined that they would evaluate the petition and discuss the project with the City of Coachella.

Time passed and the new school year, 2017-2018 began. Frida was now in the 6^{th} grade running for ASB President. She asked her classmates to vote for her so she could continue to work for the unfinished traffic signal project. After a very competitive election, and an eloquent speech from Frida in front of more than 400 students, her supportive grandparents and classmates, Frida became ASB President.

At this same time, Frida's 69 -year-old grandmother, Virginia Arriaga, a Coachella resident and greatest supporter of Frida, started to feel chronic fatigue, loss of appetite and also started to lose weight. She had been at every meeting congratulating Frida at her accomplishments and also encouraged Frida to keep going when she realized that the traffic signal installation was taking longer than expected. She also taught Frida how to recite "The Lord's Prayer" when things were getting difficult." Three weeks later, after unsuccessful visits to many specialists Frida's grandmother passed away from a rare blood disease that happens to one person out of a million.

In January 2019, the City of Coachella invited Frida to attend the City Council Meeting (below) for final approval of the installation of the Traffic Signal. Mayor Hernandez mentioned that this is a prime example of how small kids like Frida can make a big impact in their community. The Mayor also said that because of Frida's petition, they had not only installed traffic signals but they had also spent over a million dollars on the street rehabilitation project. Frida thanked them for working together with CVUSD and installing the street signal for the safety of the kids."

Mr. Arriaga says his family is deeply honored that the City of Coachella is honoring Frida as such a young age as an example of our democracy in action and how much they care for the future of the city and youth.

Mr. Arriaga was willing to have me share that the women in his life have had an amazing influence on Frida. Frida's mother, Mirna, has a BS degree from Pueblo University in Mexico. Prior becoming a full-time mother to Frida and her brother, Imanol, Mirna worked as a substitute Math teacher. Frida's paternal grandmother, Virginia, worked for 14 years at Food for Less as a cashier. Living with the family, she became particularly close to Frida. Clearly, Frida has inherited her love of math, work ethic and values from these two wonderful women.

Frida's father, Manuel Arriaga, also has a BS degree from Pueblo University in Mexico and now teaches English and ELD at La Familia H.S in Thermal. His father, Manuel Arriaga, Sr. was also a teacher in Pueblo, Mexico. While in Mexico, Manuel Arriaga Sr., his wife Virginia and young son (Frida's father) Manuel, brought the community together and raised money to build a church in Pueblo. Clearly, Frida has inherited her sense of civic responsibility, persistence and responsibly for taking civic action from her grandparents and father.

Educated teachers today in Mexico make \$400 per month and can barely take care of their family. Such was the reason, Manuel Arriaga, Sr. (Frida's grandfather) came to the City of Coachella around 1998 (a long, hard trek) - so his family could have a better life he gave up his love of teaching and went to work in the fields then in maintenance at the LaQuinta Hotel. I couldn't help but think how hard it must have been for Frida's smart grandmother and educated grandfather — both so involved in their community - to give up all the relative comforts they had and come to America

so their son, Manuel and granddaughter, Frida and the rest of the family could have a better life. We in the Coachella Valley can't help but be grateful that the Arriaga family is part of our community.

Frida's favorite subject is still math; running cross country and track team and is active in the Ophelia Project, having learned about it from Peggy Mengel, our AAUW Palm Springs Tech Trek Alumni Club Chair. Manuel and Muria Arriaga are grateful for all AAUW-Palm Springs Branch has contributed daughter, Frida's educational growth and personal development.
