# **Lunch at Bobby Botina's**

# Did you know?

There's another opportunity to donate if you are 70 ½ or older and do not itemize your deductions. If you have not completed your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), because you have nowhere to spend it, consider giving it to charity. Donating to charity from your IRA generally results in a tax benefit. Normally, distributions from an IRA are taxed. However, an individual who is age 70 ½ or older may donate to a qualified charity (e.g., a 501(c)(3) like AAUW Fund or AAUW CA SPF for Tech Trek) and not pay tax on the distribution.

The donation must be paid directly from the IRA to the charity (the check drawn on the IRA must be payable to the charity). Even better, the distribution can be counted as part of your required minimum distribution (RMD).

# How has AAUW empowered me?

Over 50 years ago I joined AAUW in Torrance, Ca. One project in that branch stands out for me. In 1989 our branch determined that a great need in our community was a way to cut down on trash going into the Palos Verde landfill. It had only a maximum 10 year lifespan before it would no longer be able to dispose of the trash from our affluent and densely populated area.

My partner and I became a committee of two to gather information to bring to the branch. While doing our research we found ourselves at the landfill interviewing management and walking around huge piles of diapers, refrigerators, broken bicycles, plastic and glass bottles, stacks of cardboard, newspapers, and hundreds of other no longer wanted items. As we watched bulldozers pushing around piles containing many items that would take decades to decompose, we knew something had to be done!

The answer had to come from the city of Torrance. Trash had to be recycled. With the full support of our branch our strategy was: educate and persuade the City Council to

support recycling with the use of city land, educate the public about the urgent need to recycle, and convince leaders of non-profit organizations to volunteer to staff the center in exchange for a portion of the profits.

We were successful. Remember, this was 1969 long before recycling was commonplace. The city had donated the land, fenced and landscaped the area. Many volunteers were staffing it. Bins began to fill and profits started coming in. AAUW had made a significant contribution to the protection of the environment and as a model for other cities before recycling became profitable private businesses. This project empowered me, my partner, and many of our members, showing them that AAUW could be a powerful change agent.

Note: *Desert Sun* March 3, 2022 "Today we are producing about 300 million tons of plastic waste each year: equal to the weight of the entire human population...Less than 10% of all plastic made has been recycled." The author is urging support for the California Plastic Pollution and Reduction and Recycling Act on the Nov. ballot.

May 29, 1851: A formerly enslaved worker turned abolitionist and women's rights activist, *Sojourner Truth* delivers her famous "Ain't I a Woman?" speech at the Women's Rights Convention in Akron, Ohio. "And ain't I a woman? Look at me! Look at my arm! I have ploughed and planted, and gathered into barns, and no man could head me! And ain't I a woman? I could work as much and



eat as much as a man—when I could get it—and bear the lash as well! And ain't I a woman? I have borne 13 children, and seen most all sold off to slavery, and when I cried out with my mother's grief, none but Jesus heard me! And ain't I a woman?"

Contemporaneous reports of Truth's speech did not include this slogan, and quoted Truth in standard English. In later years, this slogan was further distorted to "Ain't I a Woman?", reflecting the false belief that as a

formerly enslaved woman, Truth would have had a Southern accent. Truth was, in fact, a New Yorker.
